

Land Acknowledgement



- While Richmond Rising seeks to strengthen the economy, improve public health and the environment – particularly in the Iron Triangle, Santa Fe and Coronado Neighborhoods, we do so with the awareness that we occupy unceded Huichin and Karkin Ohlone territory.
- We acknowledge that land theft of indigenous homelands, and the dismantling of indigenous sovereignty, was done to advance colonization.
- We acknowledge that capitalism and white supremacy are branches of colonization that have persisted throughout hundreds of years of oppression, are alive today, and contribute to keeping Black, Indigenous, and all other People of Color from thriving.
- We further acknowledge that this country's political economy and social institutions were built on the forced labor of African people on stolen land through violent, systematic abduction from their homelands and enslavement over hundreds of years.

Land Acknowledgement



- We further acknowledge the exploitation of immigrant and refugee communities as modern forms of cheap and disposable labor are regularly carried out on stolen land.
- Thus, we acknowledge that we have been impacted and harmed by these histories and experiences imposed on our ancestors and communities. We further uplift the shared struggle among Black, Indigenous, and All People of Color.
- We also acknowledge that indigenous people continue to live here, steward the land, and resist settler colonialism.
- We conclude that our Land acknowledgement is an active and evolving statement and process. It requires us to recognize historical injustices and invites us in to be active participants in our collective healing.

Richmond Rising



- The City of Richmond and 6 local organizations (together known as 'Richmond Rising') received \$35 million to bring health, economic, and environmental benefits to the Iron Triangle, Santa Fe, and Coronado neighborhoods.
- Richmond Rising is supported by the California Strategic Growth Council's Transformative Climate Communities Program.

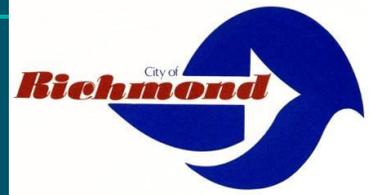



RRIP BEFORE 2025 UPDATES

- 20% of units owned by one building owner inspected by the city. Building owners self-certified 80% of their units.
- **More units exempted from Program:** Certain types of affordable housing, Section 8, accessory dwelling units, mobile home parks, vacant units, transient housing, buildings occupied by the owner or relative of the owner.
- **Only owners notified of inspection:** The owner received notice by mail of an upcoming inspection.



HABITABLE HOUSING FOR ALL: ACCE RICHMOND WINS RESIDENTIAL RENTAL HOUSING INSPECTION ORDINANCE

100% of covered residential rental units to be inspected
no self-certification process



City will create a Tenant Habitability Plan Process




INSPECTIONS CAN LEAD TO A MORE ENERGY EFFICIENT HOME

The City can now use the inspection process to share information with landlords and tenants about opportunities to reduce home energy use.




DECARBONIZATION

- Fixing leaks and closing holes







Low-income Transportation Options

Programs, services, and other options for all, including public transit services, on-demand and paratransit, and carshare services

Clipper START Program

What: A program that offers 50% off single-ride fares on Bay Area transit

Requirements:

- Be a resident of SF Bay Area
- Be 19-64 years old
- Not have an RTC Clipper Card for people with disabilities
- Have an income of 200% of the federal poverty level or less

Youth/Senior Clipper Cards

What: Youth, seniors, riders with disabilities and income-qualified riders can receive reduced fares and access to discounted passes. Riders between the age 5-18 or 65 and over can apply for a Youth or Senior Clipper card by mail, email or fax. Or get a card in-person.

Requirements:

- Be 5-18 years old or 65 and older – Must show ID (passport, drivers ID, etc.)



How to apply: Application can be found in the back, however, applications must be submitted by mail, email or in-person

RTC Clipper Cards

What: Riders under age 65 with qualifying disabilities can apply for a Regional Transportation Connection (RTC) Clipper card. The RTC Card entitles you to a reduced fare on fixed-route transit, rail and ferry systems throughout the San Francisco Area. Your RTC Discount Card is also a Clipper card.

Requirements:

- Requirements varies based on type of application
 1. Basic Eligibility
 2. Medical Eligibility

How to apply: you'll need to visit a participating transit agency location. Qualified applicants are then mailed an RTC Clipper card. For more information about eligibility, how to apply, how to renew and how attendant cards work, visit 511.org.



R-Transit (Paratransit)

What: R-Transit is a program within the City Manager's Office that provides low-cost transportation services to seniors (55 and older) and persons with disabilities who reside in the City of Richmond and the unincorporated areas of East Richmond Heights, El Sobrante, Kensington, North Richmond, Hasford Heights and Rollingwood.

Requirements:

- You must be either a resident of Richmond, North Richmond, El Sobrante, or Kensington

*Applicants between the ages of 18-54 must provide proof of disability.

R-Transit (Paratransit) – RAPID Program w/ Lyft

What: The R-Transit program’s newest addition, RAPID, offers R-Transit clients a subsidy to use Lyft for on-demand trips in the cities of Richmond, El Cerrito, North Richmond, El Sobrante, Kensington, San Pablo, and Pinole. RAPID will also expand service to and from the Contra Costa Regional Medical Center and Veterans hospital in Martinez, CA.

Requirements:

- Must have a smart phone
- Credit/debit card
- Completed [registration and waiver of liability forms](#) on file with R-Transit

*R-Transit staff will send clients a RAPID Rider Guide once the registration and waiver of liability forms are received and processed. The guide will provide further instructions on setting up and using the RAPID service.

Type of Service	Curb-to-curb. Clients will be picked up and dropped off at the curb. The Lyft driver will not be required to assist passenger.
Trip Cost	Most trips that originate and end in Richmond, El Cerrito, Kensington, El Sobrante, San Pablo, Pinole, and North Richmond will cost the client a minimum of \$3.00. The client will pay the first \$3.00 of each one way trip, and the City will provide a subsidy to cover the next \$17.00 of the ride. When the total cost of a one way trip exceeds \$20.00, the customer is responsible for the overage. Trips that originate or end in Martinez will be at a higher cost.
Maximum # of trips	40 Lyft trips: 20 classic Lyft rides and 20 shared rides.

East Bay Paratransit

What: East Bay Paratransit is a public transit service for people who are unable to use regular buses or trains, like those operated by AC Transit and BART, because of a disability or a health-related condition. East Bay Paratransit transports riders from their origin to their destination in vans equipped with a wheelchair lift.

Requirements:

- Must have a disability or a health-related condition
 - Then, you must complete a written application and arrange for an in-person interview at their offices

Richmond Moves



 - iii. Roadside assistance
 - iv. Insurance


